



Welcome home, brave brother

BRAVE toddler Isaiah Muller received a warm welcome from his big brother Ezekiel when he arrived at Adelaide Airport yesterday.

Now Isaiah and his family face a month-long wait to determine whether the trip to London for treatment to save his sight was a success.

The toddler, 2, travelled with his mother Olivia and father Chris, but had to leave his five brothers behind.

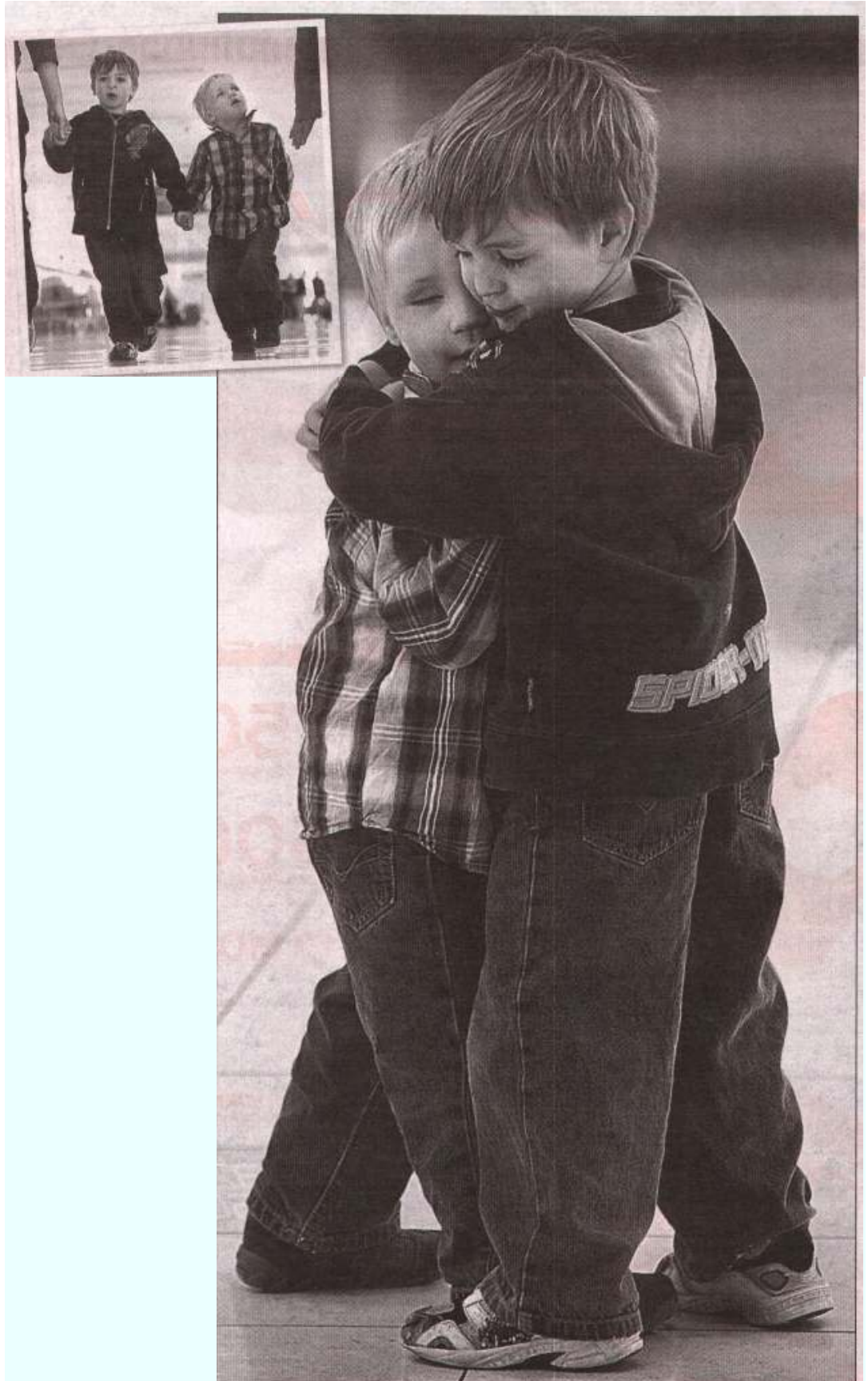
Mr Muller said the treatment went as well as could be expected.

Mrs Muller said: "It's bit of a waiting game. I think (the doctors) are fairly confident."

Isaiah was diagnosed with retinoblastoma, a rare form of cancer, at age 18 months. His right eye had to be removed to prevent the cancer spreading to his brain, leaving him with poor sight from one eye.

The Women's and Children's Hospital Foundation raised \$84,000 to fund the trip for Isaiah to undergo specialised radiotherapy treatment at London's St Bartholomew's Hospital.

"It's absolutely outstanding so I just want to say a massive, massive thank you to every single person who donated," Mrs Muller said.
